

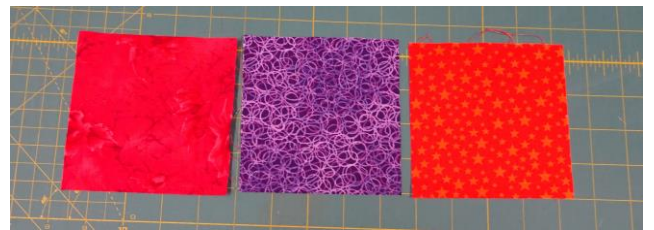
# Tennessee

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This makes a 12" block and a real scrap buster, which as we all know, means we can then buy more fabric.

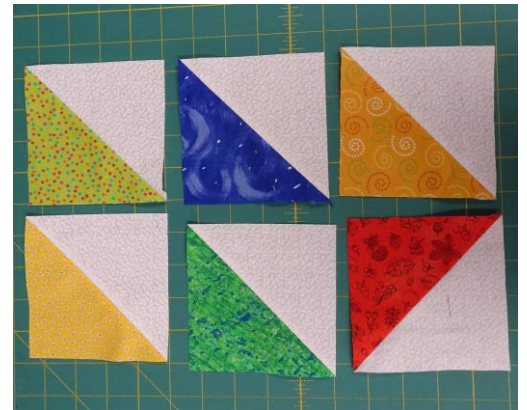
Use white or white on white for the light triangles. The three 4 ½ inch squares and the six half triangles can be of any bright fabric you have in your stash. When I made the sample I cut 6 white on white 5 inch squares and 6 – five inch squares of bright colors. Then I sewed them together to make 12 half square triangles. You use six half square triangles for one block and six to create a second block. **Two blocks for the price of one and for the comfort quilt committee.** A win/win I'd say. After I sewed the 5 inch squares together to create half square triangles, I trimmed them to 4 ½ inch squares.

Step One: Cut three 4 ½ inch squares from three different bright prints.



Step Two: Create six half square triangles with white as one half and a different bright color as the other half. Finished measurement is 4 ½ inches.

Arrange the nine squares as below to complete your Tennessee block.



This is what my other block looked like. This is a very fun block to make.
